

# Stories of Oxford Road

Interview someone in your family or someone you know in your community. You can record the interview on a phone, in an online call, write down notes or a combination to help you remember what was said!

Some of the questions are closed, with yes or no answers. If someone says yes or no, you can ask them to tell you more as a follow up question!

## Activity 1: Interview Questions

1. When did you move to Oxford Road?
2. What brought you here? (Why did you move here?)
3. What places did/do you like to visit?
4. Did you come here with your family?
5. Did you come to Oxford Road for work? (Tell me more about your work)
6. Who did you live with - family, shared house?
7. What are your favourite memories of Oxford Road?
8. Where would go for fun - cinema, library, clubs, race-track?

## Interview Questions (continued)

9. Do you have any photos of Oxford Road?

10. Did you go to school on the Oxford Road? (Tell me more about your school)

11. Did you have to travel far for work?

12. What is your favourite thing about living on the Oxford Road?

13. How would you describe the Oxford Road to someone who have never visited before?

You can also use the timeline to ask specific questions about specific places:

Example: What do you remember about the Pavillion?

### Activity 2: Make a research board

Once you have interviewed family or community members, you can put together everything you have learned into a research board with drawings, photos and notes!

### Activity 3: Drawing

Drawing is a great way to get to know the local area. It helps to highlight details that we might miss when we are walking past!

Make some drawings from photographs, memory or in person of the Oxford Road to go with your research board!
