These walking maps link the Riverside Museum at Blake's Lock to Reading Museum in the town centre and Blake's Lock to the River Thames illustrating Reading's long history on the way.

The trail from the town centre passes through the Abbey Quarter, including the Victorian Forbury Gardens and the remains of Reading's Royal Abbey, then along the River Kennet on the Oscar Wilde memorial walk, beside the walls of the Reading Gaol site. Continue under the bridge and follow the footpath along the canal towards the Riverside Museum at Blake's Lock.

Alternatively, you can walk to the Riverside Museum from the Oracle shopping centre along the River Kennet in under ten minutes.

The Riverside Museum at Blake's Lock is an extension of Reading Museum and tells the story of Reading's two rivers – the Thames and the Kennet. It occupies two former industrial buildings, the Screen and Turbine Houses. The Screen House displays include a beautiful Gypsy caravan, made on the banks of the Kennet, a video about Gypsy life and a medieval mill wheel found when The Oracle shopping centre was built.

The Turbine House is a unique building that spans the River Kennet, with waterside views. You can see preserved turbine machinery and summertime art exhibitions.




Parking There is limited parking – remember to collect a car park token from Bel and The Dragon to exit the site.
